

Why Do We Manage Right-of-Way?

The public areas on which people walk and drive are often the largest contributors to how a City is experienced and enjoyed. These public areas including streets, sidewalks, alleys, medians, parkways, curbs and gutters are all part of a larger system which includes pedestrian and motor traffic as well as coordinated placement of underground and overhead utilities.

By local, state, and federal requirements, these public areas are regulated to meet rigid engineering standards with respect to utilization and life safety. The addition of new structures to the Right-of-Way [such as additional plantings or a new turn lane] must be designed to compliment existing Rights-of-Way and their users. It is also necessary to preserve public access to these areas. Street and sidewalk closures, construction activities and utility work must be properly permitted and scheduled to ensure minimal interruptions to the flow of pedestrian and vehicle traffic.

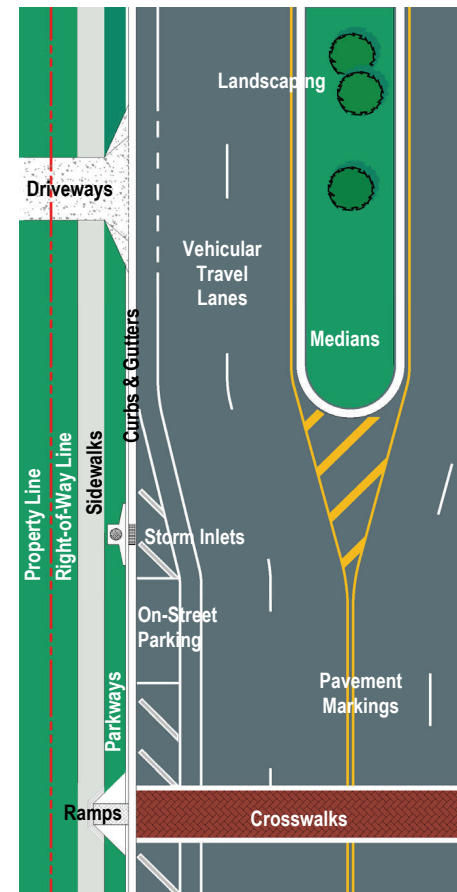

Right-of-Way Use Permits



City Code Section 30-10 through 30-20

What Is the Right-of-Way?

Public Right-of-Way refers to the area of land dedicated for public use, located between parcels of privately owned land. Public Right-of-Way can include streets, alleys, parkways, sidewalks, drainage facilities, and other infrastructure. The Right-of-Way is typically dedicated for pedestrian and vehicular movement but can be used for other purposes, such as the placement of streetscaping [landscaping, signage, public art, lighting] and the placement of private and public utility equipment, above and below ground.

In the City of Sarasota, the Right-of-Way is managed by the Transportation Engineering Division of the Neighborhood and Development Services Department. Only the City may build, or allow others to build, structures in the City Right-of-Way. No person or outside agency may construct or place structures or objects in, or otherwise block access to, the City Right-of-Way without a **Right-of-Way Use Permit** and/or an **Encroachment Agreement** from the City. Encroachment Agreements [for fences, irrigation systems, walkways, place conduits/cables etc.] have an annual cost of \$100.00, and the owner is also required to provide liability insurance to

Right-of-Way Permits for Driveways, Sidewalks, Curbs, Gutters, Crosswalks, Inlets and Accessible Ramps

To construct any of the above residential or commercial improvements which will occupy the Right-of-Way, an applicant must complete the following:

- Prepare and submit a scaled drawing of the proposed work *
- Fill out a Permit Application
- Submit Permit Fee
- Successfully pass two field inspections **

In many cases, constructing these improvements will require temporary closures of the Right-of-Way. In the case of driveway, sidewalk, curb and gutter or ramp construction, a one-week period will be allowed for Permittee to complete the construction work after which the appropriate fee will be assets.

**Both an Initial and a Final Inspection will be required and will be performed by an Inspector from the Neighborhoods & Development Services Department. To schedule an inspection, call (941) 954-4126 between 8am and 4pm M-F. Your call must be received a minimum of 1 working day prior to the desired inspection time.

Failure to schedule inspections will result in a fine of \$100.00 for each neglected inspection.

TEMPORARY OCCUPATION of an On-Street Parking Space

To obtain a Right-of-Way Use Permit allowing occupation of an on-street parking space, an applicant must provide information which illustrates where the parking space(s) is located and any existing restrictions on the spaces [such as timed parking limits, paid parking conditions, and handicapped accessibility]. It is the responsibility of the permit holder to cone off the space(s) and to display a copy of the permit at all times.

TEMPORARY CLOSURE of a Public Sidewalk, Bike Lane or Vehicular Travel Lane

To obtain a Right-of-Way Use Permit allowing temporary closure or obstruction of the public Right-of-Way, an applicant must provide a Maintenance of Traffic Plan* to be approved by Transportation Engineering. This plan shall demonstrate how pedestrian, bicycle and vehicular traffic will be safely re-routed during the length of the proposed closure. After approval, the Permittee will be required to provide notice of the closure details and dates to local transportation agencies and all other affected parties.**
